Reception centres capacity and IDPs HHs trends

In April 2023, 30,596 individuals were recorded in seven reception centres in Borno state, with women and children accounting for 88% of the total. Consistent with previous reports, the displaced population in reception centre has been decreased by 5% compared with last month. In the seven reception centres across Bama, Dikwa, Gwoza, Monguno, and Ngala LGAs, 1,311 households (HHs) (3,269 individuals) of new arrivals were registered, representing a 45% decrease from the previous month. During this period, 1,422 individuals (Bama 120, Gwoza 8, Monguno 1,280 and Pulka 14) moved from the reception centers.

8,044 HHs have stayed for over three months against recommended 72 hours for referrals in Banki (254), Bama (414), Gwoza (288), Monguno (611), Ngala (1.602), Pulka (4.750) and Dikwa (125) reception centres. There is an immediate need for CCCM, shelter, NFI, WASH, food, protection and health care services across the reception centres







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HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE AND GAPS

SHELTER

ACTIVE SERVICES

Shelter services include shelter construction, reinforcement, shelter kit distribution and shelter repair.

GAPS

4.572 HHs (total overstretch) urgently need shelters responses across the seven reception centres. 897 HHs living outside, 154 HHs referred for sharing modalities. for secondary health care in Bama, Banki, Dikwa, Pulka, Gwoza, Monguno, and Ngala

NUTRITION ACTIVE SERVICES

Supplementary Feeding for children, malnourished children, pregnant and lactating mothers, and Screening for malnourished children.

There are cases of malnutrition observed in Banki and Bama. In Monguno, a nutrition partner needs to support the beneficiaries with supplementary feeding to the children, pregnant women and lactating women

È HEALTH **ACTIVE SERVICES**

Medical screening, referrals, vaccination, immunization, distribution of essential medicine in all RCs.

GAPS

No functional primary health care is available in Gwoza and Monguno reception centres. There is a need

NON-FOOD ITEMS (NFI) NFI

ACTIVE SERVICES

NFI services include the distribution of NFI kits (Standard/Improved). **GAPS**

4,724 HHs including new arrivals HHs urgently need NFI items; mosquito nets, blankets, water storage items, hygiene kits, and soap are the most demanded items

PROTECTION PROTECTION **ACTIVE SERVICES**

Protection services include Legal Documentation, Gender Based Violence (GBV) services, general protection services, referrals, vulnerability screening, child protection services and mental health and pschosocial suppport (MHPSS) services.

GAPS

Legal aid is required in Ngala, Pulka, and Dikwa. In Ngala, a partner for GBV activities is required.

CAMP COORD. AND CAMP MANAGEMENT

ACTIVE SERVICES

ACTIVE SERVICES

CCCM services includes registration, sensitization, sanitation, shelter allocation, service/intervention advocacy, coordination meetings, referrals and complaints and feedback mechanism.

GAPS

The CCCM partners in Bama, Ngala and Pulka are raising concerns of over congestion of the RCs. Advocacy should be done at the sector level to have response to the existing gaps analysis in the reception center.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE (WASH) **ACTIVE SERVICES**

WASH services include construction of latrines and showers, distribution of sanitation materials, dislodgement of latrines/solid waste, chlorination of water, hygiene promotion and maintenance of WASH facilities.

GAPS


There is urgent need to upgrade water source around sanitary facilities baths/latrines in Banki, Monguno, Ngala, Gwoza and Dikwa. Bama and Pulka each have four damaged latrines. WASH activities are required for new arrivals in Bama

FOOD SECURITY (FS)

Food security services include wet feeding, general food distribution and cash based transfer.



GAPS

3.164 HHs received in kind food distribution. There are no active wet feeding partners at the Banki, Monguno, and Ngala reception centres. In Pulka, Gwoza, new arrivals 1,171 HHs require SCOPE registration to receive food assistance.
