

## NORTHEAST NIGERIA RECEPTION CENTRE MANAGEMENT REPORT




In the month of January 2023, 29,704 individuals were recorded in all 7 RCs, with 62% of the total number are children up to 17 years. 1,340 families (5,002 Individuals) of new arrivals were registered in all active Reception centers across 5 LGAs (Bama, Dikwa, Gwoza, Monguno, and Ngala) in Borno state. Out of the 9,988 families only 5,750 benefitted from a form of food distribution. Most highted military operations, poor living conditions, and voluntary relocations for safety as reasons for the movements

In comparison to all the RCs Gwoza hosts the highest numbers of IDPs in reception centers with Pulka ward accomodating 4,500 families with 10,901 individuals. while a further 1,896 families have taken shelter in the Gwoza RC. As much as efforts of decongestion are still ongoing, the situation on ground calls for concerted efforts by all stakeholders to ensure improved living conditions of those affected and received across all the 7 RCs.

In Ngala there are 1,461 families are living in the highly congested RC with a capacity of 100 families. To ease the burden of the new arrivals, some have been refered to relatives in the camps and host community causing more protection risks.



# SHELTER

**ACTIVE SERVICES** 

Shelter services include shelter construction, reinforcement, shelter kit distribution and shelter repair.

### GAPS

In Gwoza the situation is dire as the RC is full to capacity forcing arrivals of 24HHs to retreat to the bush. In Ngala 1,463 HHs, Gwoza 709HHs nd 3 in Bama. Overall shelter gaps per each RC are; Ngala 1,293 HHs, Gwoza 513 HHs Bama 406 HHs (13HHs settling in a nearby school,

## NFI NON-FOOD ITEMS (NFI)

#### **ACTIVE SERVICES**

NFI services include the distribution of NFI kits (Standard/Improved). **GAPS** 

4,837HHs in Banki in need of NFIs though they were moved to the HC due to congestion of the RC. NFIs needs; 934HHs in Monguno, 653HHs in Ngala, 636HHs in Bama, 535HHs in Gwoza, and 146HH in Dikwa.

# **CAMP COORD. AND CAMP MANAGEMENT**

CCCM services includes registration, sensitization, sanitation, shelter allocation, service/intervention advocacy, coordination meetings, referrals and complaints and feedback mechanism.

#### **GAPS**

The CCCM partner in Monguno are raising concerns of over congestion of the RC.

## **FOOD SECURITY (FS)** 4.322 **ACTIVE SERVICES** FS services include wet feeding, general food distribution and cash based transfer.

In Ngala 182 HHs have not benefited with food interventions and need urgent, response. In Pulka there is need for a wet feeding partner. In other RCs some beneficiaries are not benefiting from partners distribution due to lack of scope cards.

## NUTRITION **ACTIVE SERVICES**

Supplementary Feeding for children, malnourished children, pregnant and lactating mothers, and Screening for malnourished children.

There are cases of malnutrition observed in Ngala, Banki, and Bama. Ngala all new arrivals have not been enrolled into the nutrition programs, while in Monguno supplementary feeding for children above 4 years is required.

#### 3 **HEALTH**

## **ACTIVE SERVICES**

Medical screening, referrals, vaccination, immunization, distribution of essential medicine in all RCs.

#### **GAPS**

No functional primary health care available in Pulka and Ngala RC's. There's need for secondary healthcare in Bama, Pulka, Gwoza, Monguno and Ngala.

## **PROTECTION**

#### **ACTIVE SERVICES**

Protection services include Legal Documentation, Gender Based Violence (GBV) services, general protection services, referrals, vulnerability screening, child protection services and mental health and pschosocial suppport (MHPSS) services.

GAPS
Need for dignity kits for adolescent girls in Pulka and women and child friendly spaces in Monguno, Ngala and Pulka. Legal assistance and GBV partner needed in Ngala.

### water, sanitation and hygiene (wash) **ACTIVE SERVICES**

WASH services include construction of latrines and showers, distribution of sanitation materials, dislodgement of latrines/solid waste, chlorination of water, hygiene promotion and maintenance of WASH facilities.

#### **GAPS**

In Gwoza the water yield is low at 10 liters/person/day. While in Pulka, Ngala and Monguno there are urgent needs for WASH dignity kits. There are 4 and 3 damaded latrines in Ngala and Gwoza and another 2 latrines in Gwoza
