<p><b>1. Updates from CCCM Cluster</b></p>	<p><b>Updates from CCCM Cluster</b> <i>(please see the presentation attached):</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li> <b>2024 HNRP:</b> For 2024, an estimated PIN is 0.26M, which is a 47% decrease compared to this year (0.5M). This figure is calculated based on the current population, population rotation in collective sites located along the area of hostilities, and out-of-site IDP population benefitting from CCCM services. The target is 0.15M IDPs, which was calculated taking into consideration partners’ capacities. Funding request – 16.9M.         </li> </ul> <p>Cluster severity mapping is based on the guidelines designed by the Global CCCM Cluster. The calculations are based on the CSM data, and 38 indicators related to the vulnerability criteria, duration of stay, security situation, site living conditions, and other. The highest scoring is assigned in rayons along the areas of hostilities and several rayons in the north, center, and south with limited CCCM coverage.</p> <p>For 2024, the Cluster will continue to maintain site-level presence and delivery of the ‘soft’ package of activities, as well as strengthen direct implementation and referral pathways to ensure better living standards in sites. In addition, the Cluster will launch activities facilitating linkages to achieve sustainable solutions:</p> <p><b>SO1:</b> Support people-centered site management approaches that promote effective engagement and participatory approaches in day-to-day running of sites.</p> <p><b>SO2:</b> Facilitate coordination and delivery of multi-sectoral assistance in sites to ensure basic needs and minimum standards are met.</p> <p><b>SO3:</b> Promote and inform responsible exit strategies and support linkages to durable solutions for residents of collective sites.</p>	<p>CCCM Cluster to share the presentation with the partners.</p>

	<p>In December 2023, the Cluster will conduct for partners a technical training on reporting for 2024, where new monitoring activities and indicators will be closely considered.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Resolution #930 on collective sites functioning:</b> Following the advocacy event ‘Right to Dignity in collective sites’ organized by the CCCM Cluster and the Ombudsman Office on 5 October, the Ministry of Reintegration launched the process to review the Resolution. The objective is to rectify inconsistencies in provisions concerning their practical implementation based on the feedback provided by the oblast-level authorities and humanitarian actors.</li> </ul> <p>CCCM Cluster collected the feedback from the partners and other Clusters and shared it with the Ministry for Reintegration. Proposed amendments were discussed during the Coordination Centre on IDP issues on 20 October. The CCCM Cluster will continue to deliver updates regarding the progress of the amendments process while simultaneously advocating for improved living standards for IDPs in Collective Sites.</p> <p><b>Sub-National Updates</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• On 9-13 October, UNHCR supported by the Cluster organized three workshops in Lviv, Vinnytsia, and Dnipro on legal framework and practical implications of Resolution 930 for humanitarian programming.</li> <li>• <b>Western hub:</b> Local authorities are engaged in monitoring exercises according to Resolution 930 and in some oblasts humanitarian partners support with this exercise. Local authorities started preparations for cold season and raised the need for light repairs (including provisions of the Resolution 930 on minimum living standards).</li> <li>• <b>Central hub</b> There is an increasing demand for generators and fuel for generators, solid fuel/wood heaters and wood. For the monitoring activities according to Resolution each oblast has slightly different approach in implementation and are in process of finalizing the lists of the sites. Cluster continues to conduct bilateral consultations to support the authorities.</li> <li>• <b>Eastern hub:</b> Evacuations are ongoing in Donetsk, Kharkivska and Zaporizka oblast. Number of evacuees remains low. CCCM Cluster partners are supporting newly opened sites in Kharkiv. Data collection for the monitoring is ongoing (Resolution 930). Implementation status in oblasts is different. Partners stand ready to support the authorities in data collection, although no such requests were received. Communication</li> </ul>	
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	is ongoing with respective focal points responsible for implementation of Resolution 930 per oblast to collect capacity building needs and advocate for proper data collection and implementation.	
<p><b>2. REACH:</b> Assessment regarding the Progress towards local integration for IDPs in collective sites in Ukraine</p>	<p><b>REACH</b> (please see the presentation attached):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>REACH presented the key finding from Durable Solutions Assessments: Progress towards local integration for IDPs in collective sites, conducted by REACH jointly with the CCCM Cluster in August 2023. This research aimed to assess the progress towards local integration for IDP households residing in collective sites of Dnipro, Vinnytsia, Uzhhorod and Mukachevo, noting however that durable solutions cannot be considered fully achieved by IDPs while they remain in collective settings. <p><b>3. Capacity Development TWG</b></p>	<p><b>Capacity Development TWG updates</b> (please see the presentation attached):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>On 16-17 October, Capacity Development WG conducted a workshop for the national pool of the CCCM trainers on “Experience Sharing and Validation Workshop with Capacity Development Working Group (CDWG)”. The objectives were to provide the opportunity to exchange the experience and lessons learned among CCCM practitioners, discuss on recommendations on how to adapt the CCCM training modules to Ukraine context and establish peer to peer support for new CCCM national trainers/ Pool of Trainers. As action points from the Workshop, the contextualization of the Standard Training Package will take place in November and will be available for use by partners after translation.</li> <li>On 19-20 and 25-26 October, CD TWG will conduct CCCM Induction training for partners, which will take place in Kyiv and Lviv.</li> </ul>	CCCM Cluster to share the presentation with the partners.

<p><b>4. Site Consolidation TWG</b></p>	<p><b>Site Consolidation TWG updates</b> <i>(please see the presentation attached)</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Site Consolidation TWG is led by the CCCM Cluster and co-chaired with IOM. Participation is not limited to CCCM partners, and representation from Shelter, WASH, Protection, and Education Clusters is welcomed.</li> <li>• Consolidation of collective sites (CSs) has become a priority issue due to the significant number amount of CSs, their dispersity across the country, low occupancy rate, and the majority not meeting minimum standards. While the Cluster is not advocating for CS closure or consolidation, it is engaging in a process that has already started by authorities in western and central oblasts and is expected to gain momentum with the anticipated closure of some sites during the implementation of Resolution 930.</li> <li>• The objective of the TWG is to ensure that humanitarian engagement and support for this process is coordinated, and that site closure and potential relocation of IDPs takes place in a principled manner that reduces protection risks and other potential harm for the IDPs affected.</li> <li>• The minutes of the first meeting are available at <a href="#">this link</a></li> </ul>	<p>CCCM Cluster to share the presentation with the partners.</p>
