Shelter services include shelter construction, reinforcement, shelter kit distribution and shelter repair.

4,023 HHs urgently need shelter responses in the seven reception centres where 390 HHs were recorded living outside, while 1,057 HHs were referred for sharing modalities. In Pulka, there is a need for sustained advocacy for more land and resources for the construction of more shelters to accommodate 169 HHs living in temporary settlements and a learning space onsite.

NFI NON-FOOD ITEMS (NFI)

ACTIVE SERVICES

NFI services include the distribution of NFI kits (Standard/Improved).

GAPS

1,894 HHs need for NFI intervention in Pukla (884 HHs), Banki (330 HHs), Monguno (300 HHs), Bama (148 HHs), Ngala (145 HHs), Dikwa (55HHs) and Gwoza (32 HHs). Particularly they are in need of blanket mats, bucket/Jerrycan, Kitchen sets, mosquito nets and sheeting.

ACTIVE SERVICES

CCCM services include registration, site service coordination and monitoring, reception centre management, awareness/sensitization, service advocacy, referrals and complaints, and feedback mechanism.

GAPS

The CCCM partners mentioned that all the seven receeption centres are congested. To relocate the shelters for the new arrivals are the major challenges in the reception centre. There are lack of food assistance support in Monguno and Pulka. In Monguno, there is need for new shelters as the old ones are worn out already.

Security (FS)

ACTIVE SERVICES

Food security services include wet feeding, general food distribution and cash based transfer.

GAPS

855 HHs received in-kind food distribution across the five reception centres during this period.

CCCM partners observed there is need of SCOPE registration and biometric card for the food assistance in Bama and Gwoza reception centre.

ACTIVE SERVICES

Supplementary feeding for children, malnourished children, pregnant and lactating mothers, and Screening for malnourished children.

GAPS

CCCM partners reported 38 malnutrition cases in Monguno and Ngala recepon centers. There is a need for more supplementary feeding for pregnant and lactating mothers in Banki, Bama, Gwoza, Ngala, and Dikwa.

🕏 HEALTH

ACTIVE SERVICES

Medical screening, referrals, vaccination, immunization, distribution of essential medicine in all RCs.

GAPS

There is need of functional primary health care in Gwoza, Dikwa and Ngala reception centres and secondary health care in Bama, Banki, Pulka, Gwoza, Monguno, and Ngala.

PROTECTION

ACTIVE SERVICES

Protection services include Legal Documentation, Gender Based Violence (GBV) services, general protection services, referrals, vulnerability screening, child protection services and mental health and pschosocial support (MHPSS) services.

GAPS

There are need for legal aid on protection concerns in Banki and Bama. Also, CCCM partners noted the lack of MHPSS services in Monguno and Ngala.

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE (WASH)

ACTIVE SERVICES WASH services include construction of latrines and showers, distribution of sanitation materials, dislodgement of latrines/solid waste management, chlorination of water, hygiene promotion and maintenance of WASH facilities.

GAPS

A total of 24 showers were damanged in Bama (4), Monguno (12) and Pulka (8) and 27 latrines are damaged in Bama (8), Ngala (5) and Pulka (10) and Dikwa (4). There are lack of lighting around the latrines in Bama, Gwoza, Pulka and Dikwa poses a protection risk to the IDPs.

In Pulka, there is need to advocate for WASH partner to support with more water trucking. In Bama, there is need for two blocks more latrines because two blocks have being decommissioned.
