

SHELTER/NFI and CCCM SECTOR Monthly Meeting Minutes [23.11.2023]

INTRODUCTION	The sector coordinator welcomed the participants to the meeting, followed by a round of introductions from all partners present physically and a presentation of the meeting agenda.	
Sector Updates Shelter and NFI gaps across BAY states	 The sector partners that there are planned relocation and return initiatives in Bama, Monguno, Ngala, Jere, and MMC throughout 2024 by the government. As highlighted by SEMA, the government has proposed the closure of the Muna camp in Jan-Feb 2024. However, there were concerns raised regarding incomplete profiling at Kawar Maila and other LGAs not yet officially informed, except for Monguno which is in the pipeline for closure. A planned donor engagement is scheduled for 28th November 2023 in Abuja due to the sector facing funding constraints. The prevailing global situation with reduced funding, coupled with the government's shift towards more durable solutions than humanitarian interventions by 2024, was highlighted. Partners were encouraged to maintain flexibility in their response strategies, allowing for easy adaptation to varying types of interventions. Following the donor engagement on 28th November 2023 a TWiG meeting session on extended camp closure is set for 29th November 2023 in Abuja with concerned sector stakeholders. The sector presented a comprehensive overview of Shelter and NFI gaps across HC and camps. Shelter assistance is required for 231,289 HHs, with breakdown 85,249 HHs in HC and 146,040 HHs in camps. NFI support is needed for 123,747 HHs, with 58,384 households in HC and 65,363 households in camps. The top 5 LGA with the most significant shelter needs in HC are Jere, Dikwa, Nganzai, Konduga and Kala Balge. In camps, the top 5 LGAs in need of shelter are Bama, Monguno, Jere, Konduga, and Ngala. 	 The sector will share the outcome of both meetings with partners after the meetings. 	- The top 5 LGAs in need of NFI in HC are Jere, Nganzai, Konduga, Maiduguri, and Mobbar. In camps, the top 5 LGAs requiring NFI assistance are Jere, Monguno, Bama, Konduga and Ngala.	
Presentation from Solidarities	 SI Presentation Highlights SI presented their Shelter/NFI Contribution and a discussion on addressing climate change threats within the community. The achievements of SI in 2023 were outlined, along with their targets for the planned interventions in 2024. SI proposed an approach for 2024 focusing on sustainable, climate-smart, innovative, and locally adapted shelter models. Emphasis was placed on refining the process for implementation. SI shared insights from a Bamboo market survey conducted in Maiduguri city in November 2023. The survey covered 35 traders and highlighted the economic benefits associated with this initiative. The presentation generated considerable interest and prompted numerous questions from the attendees. As a result, the sector recommended organizing a TWiG meeting to explore deeper into the presentation's content and address additional queries or insights. Fire incident report update	 The sector presented an overview of the fire incident with partners that between October to November 2023 16 fire incidents recorded through 14 IDPs sites. 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NHF	 The incident destroyed 2,990 emergency and makeshift shelters with the affected population losing their NFs, food ratio cards, biometric cards, means of identification. Also 2 young girls aged 5 and 4 lost their lives and also a 12-year-old boy hospitalized due to injurice sustained during the fire. The situation has exposed the affected population to undignified living conditions exposing them to protection and health risks. Fire triggers were identified, ranging from cooking within IDP areas to improper shelter materials, burning refuse near or within camps, and accidental causes like children playing. Shelter/NFI Sector - Fire Incidents Report November, 2023 - Nigeria ReliefWeb The sector plans to initiate an awareness campaign using community-based theatre, supported by a partner experienced in similar activities. Emphasizing the importance of awareness, the sector encouraged partners to enhance their efforts in promoting fire safety awareness within IDP sites. The sector outlined targets for 2024, targeting to assist 1.2 million individuals with \$19 million ask for to CCCM activities and a 1.8 million people target with \$52 million ask for shelter and NFI activities. Specific funding opportunities were highlighted during the meeting, the NHF, which has allocated \$13 million for various sectoral responses. The sector clarified that NHF's standard allocation is earmarked for multisectoral responses. The fund is categorized into five envelopes designed to address critical areas within humanitarian responses: I.
