


Sinjar/Sennar updates

Key updates

- More than <u>130,000</u> people have fled Sinjar, Sennar state, since June 24 as the armed conflict has spread across into the Sennar State (OCHA).
- Displaced people have sought refuge in different states, like Gedaref, Kassala, Blue Nile, White Nile, and the Red Sea (Port Sudan). (Authorities and Partners)
- Local authorities in <u>Gedaref State</u> estimate some 26,000 have recently arrived. In the <u>Blue Nile State</u>, the Sudanese Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) estimates some 30,000, while in <u>Kassala</u>, <u>White Nile</u> and <u>Red Sea State</u>, local authorities and partners report some 5,000, 3,900 and 500 respectively.
- Cluster has had an <u>ad hoc</u> call with partners- a <u>flash note</u> on the response will be shared in the course of the day
- Reception centres being established (3) in Gedaref, (2) in Kassala.
- Sites / site-like settings becoming <u>unavoidable</u>- alternative options limited

Guiding Principles - Minimum Actions- Site Management

1. Cluster Strategic objectives:

- . The Cluster has developed its 2024 strategy within four main priority objectives:
 - Enhancing overall coordination and assistance monitoring: This involves ensuring that all activities are well-coordinated and that the assistance provided is monitored for effectiveness and efficiency.
 - Community engagement & participation: It is crucial to involve the community in decision-making processes and ensure their active participation in the management of the sites.
 - Capacity-sharing initiatives to facilitate self-management of sites and site-like settings: This involves building the capacity of the community to manage their own sites, thereby promoting self-reliance and sustainability.
 - Enhancing site protective environment through small-scale site improvements: This
 involves making small-scale improvements to the sites to ensure a safe and dignified
 living condition for the LDDs.

2. Guiding principles:

- Context: More than 10.5 million IDPs are displaced in Sudan, according to the IOM DTM Mobility Update-June 2024.
- Cluster estimates that 44 percent of the displaced live in sites and site-like settings, including camps, schools/public buildings, informal settlements, and/or improvised shelters.
- The current funding constraints and capacity limitations faced by partners require prioritization in the CCCM* programming to ensure the limited resources are maximized while addressing the most in need and pressing issues in sites and stite-like settings.
- Response to the needs is context (state-based) and hence requires contextualization accordingly while ensuring practical minimum standards are applied and with protection centrality.
- Government counterparts and the host community are primarily the first responders; hence, partner agencies need to ensure adequate consultation with all stakeholders involved.
- In light of these, the Cluster recommends partners to consider the following key principlesnot exhaustive:

BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

More than 8.8 million people fled their homes since fighting erupted between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) in mid-April 2023. An estimated 6.8 million people are displaced within the country and have taken refuge in 7,251 locations of which a projected twenty-five per cent live in sites and site-like settings i.e., camps, collective centers (communal /public building including in schools) and temporal informal settlements. The Site Management Cluster was activated in July 2023 to address the growing needs of the forcibly displaced people hosted in sites, and site-like settings.

The Cluster is led by UNHCR and co- coordinated by the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) at the national level. The Cluster has also put in place sub-national coordination mechanism in 5 states, i.e., in Gedaref, Kassala, Northern, Red Sea, and White Nille states. Plans are under-away to expand and/or align the Cluster sub-national mechanism with that of the ongoing Sudan operation coordination review led by OCHA. Co-coordination at the sub-national level with I/National NGOs is being sought with the White Nile state already having UNHCR as the lead and co-coordinated by the Sudanese Red Crescent Society (SRCS). The rest of the existing sub-national coordination is primarily supported by UNHCR CLA through delegated Focal Points. More than 20 partners are registered with the Cluster however only a handful 10 are actively reporting site management programming at the respective areas of coverage. Cluster partners outreach is expected to expand with a coverage of 11 states in May reported up from 7 states in January 2024, Partner capacities are limited mainly linked to constraints in funding but also a broader challenge in access and evolving security context in areas of response. With the evolving context including the establishment of a Sudan Operation Coordination Centre (SOCC) in response to risks of famine and the growing outreach / coverage by site management partners, the Cluster
