<p>1. <b>Updates from CCCM Cluster</b></p>	<p><b>Updates from CCCM Cluster</b> <i>(please see the presentation attached):</i></p> <p><b>2024 Mid-year partners' achievements review</b></p> <p>In January-June 2024, fifteen CCCM partners supported 61,241 people in 1,028 collective sites across the county, accounting for 71.5% of the overall site population (85,505) in 52% of the sites. The beneficiaries include 21% children (under 18 years), 31% older people (60+), 60% - women.</p> <p>53,8 % of overall people reached were located in Dnipropetrovska (15,5%), Lvivska (13,7%), Kharkivska (11,6%), Zaporizka (6,5%) and Zakarpatska (6,5%) oblasts.</p> <p>Achievements per CCCM Cluster 2024 HNRP Strategic Objectives could be summarized as follows:</p> <p><u>CCCM Cluster Strategic Objective 1:</u> Support people-centered site management approaches that promote effective engagement and participatory approaches in day-to-day running of sites.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Support site management structures – 72% achievement (48,185 people reached);</li> <li>- Site level community-led activities – 37% achievement (15,015 people reached);</li> <li>- Capacity building – 137% achievement (1,989 people reached).</li> </ul> <p><u>CCCM Cluster Strategic Objective 2:</u> Facilitate coordination and delivery of multi-sectoral assistance in sites to ensure basic needs and minimum standards are met.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Essential items (in-kind) – 38% achievement (22,826 people reached);</li> <li>- Essential items (cash) – 32% achievement (4,310 people reached);</li> <li>- Care and maintenance (cash) – 45% achievement (12,276 people reached);</li> <li>- Care and maintenance (in kind) – 142% achievement (13,954 people reached).</li> </ul>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. CCCM Cluster Strategic Objective 3: Promote and inform responsible exit strategies and support linkages to durable solutions for residents of collective sites.

- Awareness raising on sustainable solutions – 14% achievement (5,100 people reached);
- IDP Profiling (HHs) – 1% achievement (38 people reached);
- Authorities supported for site consolidation and closure – 2% achievement (12 sites).

The low performance on Objective 3 is due to a shift in focus in 2024 from sustainable solutions and site consolidation to supporting new waves of displacement from eastern and northern oblasts, as well as underreporting. The Cluster will also follow up with partners for further reporting on Objective 3 activities.

#### **UHF 2024 Winter Response Reserve Allocation**

On 5 July, the Ukrainian Humanitarian Fund started the First Standard (Winter Response) Allocation. This fund aims to support the 2024-2025 Winter Response Plan and prioritize urgent, high-impact activities in the 2024 Humanitarian Response Plan. Only partners with pre-identified winter response projects were eligible to apply for funding. The Allocation focused on two sectors:

- **Shelter/NFI**: winter energy needs (with up to 70% of assistance to be provided in cash modality), winter cash for utilities.
- **CCCM**: winter repairs and maintenance, winter heating, and winter fuel.

The deadline for project submissions was 19 July. The strategic review and funding disbursement will take place in August. In September, partners are expected to launch the implementation.

#### **2025 Humanitarian Programme Cycle**

The Cluster provided updates on the development of the Humanitarian Needs and Response Plan, detailing key dates and providing a brief description of each step.

- **1 August** – MSNA dataset realized.
- **15 August** – preliminary Cluster PIN and severity.
- **30 August** – draft Cluster narrative including objectives, activities, and indicators.
- **6 September** – final Cluster final PIN and severity.
- **12 September** – final Cluster narrative including objectives, activities, and indicators.
- **22 December** – 2025 HNRP published.

The CCCM Cluster will convene SAG meetings to consult with key partners on aligning the strategic priorities and monitoring framework for next year's planning. Partners will also be contacted to provide feedback on specific points.

<p>2. <b>CCCM Cluster:</b> Sub-National Updates</p>	<p><b>CCCM Cluster Sub-National Updates</b> <i>(please see the presentation attached):</i></p> <p><b>West Hub</b></p> <p><b>Ongoing Government-Led Evacuation from Donetska Oblast to Rivne and Volyn:</b> In July, 190 people were evacuated from Donetska Oblast to Volynska Oblast, most of whom are staying in collective sites. Rokada/UNHCR provided essential services, including mental health support, case management, legal assistance, social accompaniment, transportation, and information sessions on CS rules and local services. Rivne Oblast is expected to receive evacuees in August, with Rokada (UNHCR) and NGO Integration Hub supporting the settlement process.</p> <p><b>Official lists of collective sites:</b> oblast authorities in Ivano-Frankivska and Ternopilska oblasts revised official lists of collective sites with Cluster support in data management and site selection criteria. Zakarpatska and Lvivska oblasts will also update their lists soon. Partners are encouraged to increase information-awareness sessions regarding Resolution 930.</p> <p><b>Operational updates:</b> Oblast-level meetings were held with new CCCM UHF partners, Posmishka UA and Caritas Ukraine, to avoid service duplication at sites. Neeka (UNHCR) and NRC are assisting in Stryi and Drohobych raions of Lvivska Oblast with IDP profiling, case management, and alternative housing solutions due to the closure of educational facilities.</p> <p><b>Central Hub</b></p> <p><b>Coordination Meetings:</b> OCHA GCM in Mykolaiv Region and Coordination Center Meeting in Vinnytsia Region focused on winterization needs. The aim was to align efforts, share information, and strategize on how to prepare and provide resources to support vulnerable populations during winter.</p> <p><b>Changes in the AoR Coverage within the Central Hub:</b> From July 2024, the oblast has been moved from the East Hub to the Central Hub. Iuliana Mazur, CCCM Cluster Sub-National Coordinator, will oversee the area. She can be contacted at mazur@unhcr.org.</p> <p><b>East Hub</b></p> <p><b>Donetska Oblast:</b> As of 20 July, a verification exercise found 9 sites closed, some due to damage from shelling. There are currently 5 active collective sites (CSs) and 2 transit centers, accommodating 67 people.</p> <p>The CCCM Cluster coordinated with partners and clusters, including UNHCR, UNFPA, and IOM, for the distribution of Non-Food Items (NFIs). A joint mission with UNHCR is planned for 23-25 July to visit CSs and meet with OMA representatives. joint mission with UNHCR will focus on visiting CSs and meeting with OMA representatives.</p>	<p>CCCM Cluster to share the presentation with the partners.</p>
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	<p><b>Operational meetings</b> Meetings were held for Dnipropetrovska, Kharkivska, and Zaporizka Oblasts to avoid duplicating partners' activities at sites and ensure the complementarity of existing efforts.</p>	
<p><b>3. Proliska:</b> Experience of accepting evacuations from Kharkivska oblast in Zakarpatska</p>	<p><b>NGO Proliska</b> <i>(please see the presentation attached)</i>:</p> <p>Proliska shared their experience in evacuating people from Kharkivska oblast and settling them in collective sites (CSs) in Zakarpatska oblast. The presentation highlighted efforts to improve living conditions in these CSs and cooperation with the Central Government in organizing evacuation trains to Western Ukraine.</p> <p>Key steps taken include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Notifying the affected population via hotline about available evacuation trains, using an information brochure from Zakarpatska oblast administration.</li> <li>• Providing transport services for people with disabilities or low mobility to the railway station in Kharkiv and to the CSs.</li> <li>• Distributing hygiene kits and other WASH items.</li> <li>• Profiling internally displaced persons (IDPs) to identify their needs and match them with suitable CSs, considering access to services.</li> <li>• Providing referrals as needed.</li> </ul>	<p>CCCM Cluster to share the presentation with the partners.</p>
<p><b>4. Updates from partners / AOB</b></p>	<p><b>Generators:</b> The CCCM Cluster expressed deep gratitude to partners for their prompt response to the Subnational Coordinators' request. Partners provided detailed information on the needs for generators in nearly 1,000 collective sites, including technical specifications and funding availability for maintenance. This data will be compiled and used for future fundraising and coordination efforts.</p>	<p>CCCM Cluster to make final document of generator needs available for partners on request.</p>
