



O1 CONTEXT OVERVIEW

The Malakal Protection of Civilians (PoC) site has been sheltering civilians since 2013 due to ongoing conflict and insecurity in the Upper Nile State. The PoC site population remained relatively consistent over the last few years with some changes due to factors such as inter-communal conflict, lack of livelihood opportunities, flooding, and influx of returnees from Sudan. OCHA reported individuals seeking refuge in the PoC from Malakal town in May 2024, highlighting sporadic incidents of instability.

While 59% of households want to leave the PoC for better livelihoods, concerns about security and access to land in their places of return hinder their desire to move. In this complex context, DRC CCCM conducts population headcount and intention survey in the PoC to inform effective programming.








47% households are hosting displaced relatives or friends.


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
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O3 DISPLACEMENT TREND




- The PoC was set up as people started to take refuge from the outbreak of civil war since December 2013.
- Since 2021 some flood affected population from around Upper Nile State are also seeking safety in the PoC.
- Since 2023, the Sudan crisis has led to a influx of returnees, although entry to the PoC has been restricted.
- In June 2023, intercommunal clashes in the PoC led to the Nuer population leaving the site for Malakal town.






13% Households have person/s with disability

- 3% of the population have difficulty in mobility
- 9% Households have patients with chronic medical condition
- **2%** of the total children are unaccompanied or separated
- **21%** of the households claimed to have not receive food assistance in July despite having DTM/SCOPE card

Malakal PoC Site Map Malakal County, Upper Nile State









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

Indented period of time to stay in the PoC


59% of the households are willing to move out of the PoC

Site residents perception of external pressure to return/leave the site.




Key factors influencing the decision to move out of the PoC

GAPACITY & RESOURCES

41% Households reported to have no source of income

10% Households rely on humanitarian assistance as their only source of income



Main sources of income

95% of the households have been able to secure space for housing in the PoC

17% of the households are using space for income generating purposes in the PoC

91% of the households own land in Malakal or elsewhere in South Sudan

76% of the households reported to have housing land or property related issues

79% of the households have been registered under DTM or SCOPE.
