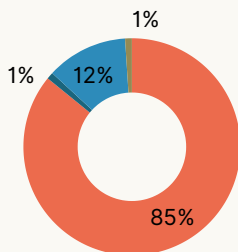
## GAZA RESPONSE

2 February 2025

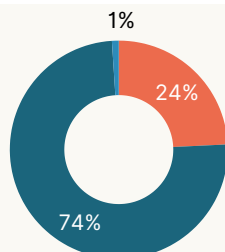
### GENERAL INFORMATION

- Assessment covers **115,247 individuals** and **23,509 households** living in 74 sites, including 63 makeshift sites, 9 UNRWA collective centers, 1 non-UNRWA collective center, and 1 scattered site in the governorates of Khan Younis (77%), Deir al Balah (14%), and Rafah (9%).
- In the majority of assessed sites (74%) KIs reported people are leaving the site. While in 24% of the sites, KIs reported no population changes since the ceasefire. In addition, in 1 site, the KI reported people were arriving.
- On average, KIs reported 1,200 individuals leaving each site.
- In addition, 10 sites were reportedly inactive as the population moved to different areas.

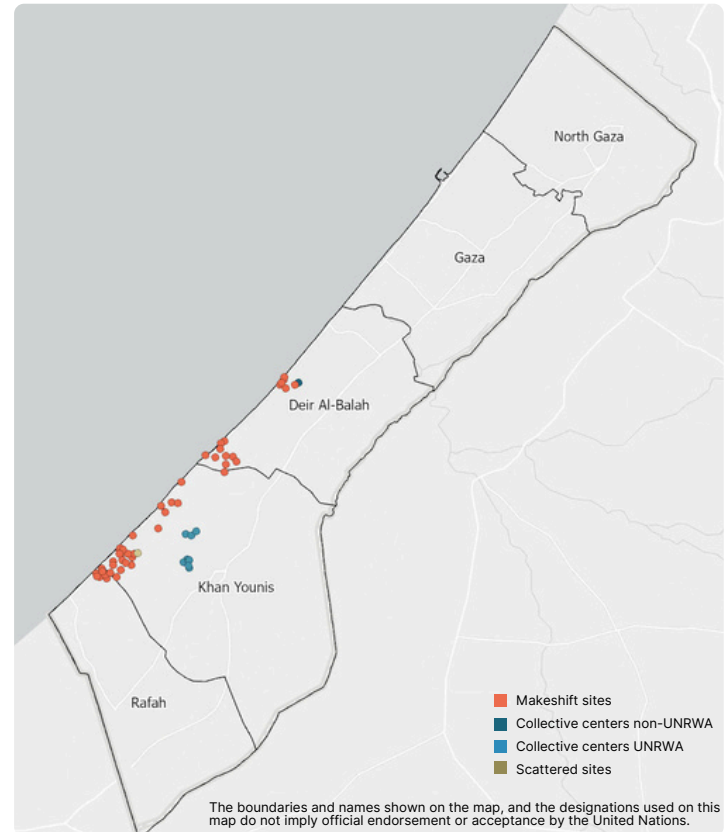

#### METHODOLOGY:

SMC partners (NRC, UNRWA, ACTED, PARC/DRC, PHC) collected information using a structured questionnaire hosted on Zite Manager. Enumerators contacted focal points (KIs) by phone calls, recording the information directly on the questionnaire online.

Calls were conducted daily during the ceasefire, the information on this report was collected between **2pm on February 1st and 2pm on February 2nd**. Cumulative findings of the site to site assessment can be consulted on the [interactive dashboard](#).

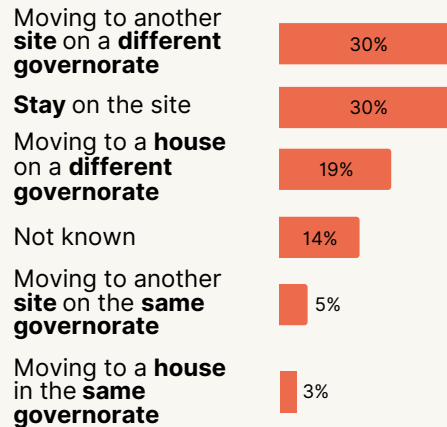

## MOVEMENT INTENTIONS

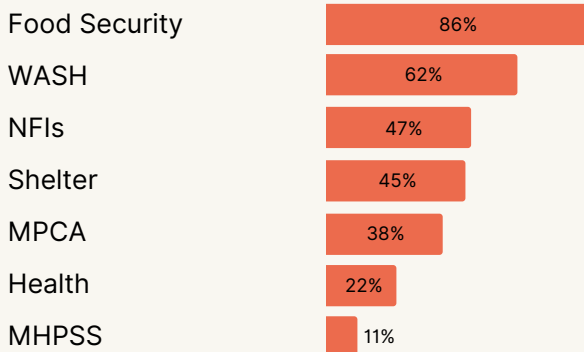
- In almost half of the sites (49%), KIs reported people were planning to move to a different governorate, to another site (30%) or their own house or relatives' house (19%).
- In almost one third of the sites assessed (30%), KIs reported the population is planning to stay on the site.
- On sites where people reported intentions to leave, KIs reported either few (reported by 19% of KIs) or half of the people will move out of the site (reported by 18%).
- The most reported governorates where people will be moving to were North Gaza (reported by KIs in 34% of the sites), Gaza (30%), followed by Rafah (24%), and Khan Younis (16%).\*

## KEY POPULATION NEEDS

Most reported **sectors with need of humanitarian assistance** are:\*



- In the Food Security sector, the most needed assistance was reportedly in kind food distributions (72%) and food vouchers or cash transfers (59%).\*
- In WASH sector the most needed assistance was reportedly drinking water (55%), water for domestic use (43%), hygiene kits (30%), and sanitation facilities (20%).\*
- The most needed NFIs were: blankets and mats (41%), emergency shelter items (30%), kitchen sets (30%), and clothing (23%) as reported by KIs.\*
- Among shelter needs reported, need for shelters (27%), weather protection (23%), and shelter repairs and upgrades (20%) were the most reported.\*

## HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE RECEIVED

- In the majority of the assessed sites (91%), KIs reported no humanitarian assistance had been received in the past 7 days.
- Only in 9% of the sites some assistance was reportedly provided. Most reported humanitarian assistance received was food assistance (reported in 7% of sites), shelter assistance (3%), MPCA (3%), and NFIs (1%).\*
